

GVPT Internship Program – Spring 2026

The Government and Politics Internship Program enables students interning in local, state, regional, and national political or policy institutions to receive course credit for their internship experience.

The GVPT Internship Program is a one-semester, two-course program in which students will develop an understanding of how their internship connects to the greater policymaking and governing process.

Students enroll in the following courses:

• GVPT377 Experiential Learning: Government and Politics Internship Program

- o 3-credit academic course that *may* be used towards the GVPT major requirements per GVPT's 'Experiential Learning Credits' policy.
- o GVPT377 is **mandatory** for participation in the GVPT Internship Program. If you cannot fit GVPT377 into your schedule, you should pursue alternate options for internship credit.
- The course will meet February 18, March 25, and April 22 from 6:30-9:15pm. There are no exceptions or alternatives for these dates.

• GVPT376 Experiential Learning

- o GVPT376 is purely elective credit and does NOT count towards GVPT major requirements. It is graded on a satisfactory/fail basis.
- O Students earn 3 to 6 elective credits for GVPT376; the number of credits earned depends upon the total number of internship hours worked during the semester.
- o GVPT376 is a hidden course, so you will not see it on the Schedule of Classes. You will receive registration information upon program acceptance.

You must complete your internship to earn credit for GVPT377 and GVPT376. You are able to get paid during your internship and participate in the program.

Requirements:

- Current GVPT major
- Minimum 3.0 GPA
- Minimum 60 credit hours
- Must not have earned credit previously for the same internship
- Must not have previously completed the GVPT Internship Program
- Internships cannot be campaign or on-campus positions (with the exception of START)
- Priority is given to students who still need to satisfy a GVPT Course of Choice and who may use GVPT377 to do so.

If you do not meet any of the above requirements but have secured an internship and need a GVPT Course of Choice 300/400 level, please contact Shayna Shor (<u>sshor@umd.edu</u>) to discuss credit options. Admission to the GVPT Internship Program is competitive and meeting eligibility requirements does not guarantee admittance to the program. It is strongly encouraged that you apply early as this is a



popular program that often has every spot filled. If the program fills before the application deadline, we will begin reviewing applications for waitlist spots.

Benefits:

- Receive 3 course credit hours towards GVPT major requirements
- Receive general elective credit for the hours worked at your internship
- Network with other students in similar internships
- Learn how to market your internship on your resume and in job interviews
- Develop relationships with professionals who can serve as references for future employment opportunities

Time Commitment:

- Students are expected to intern between 9-20 hours per week during the semester.
- GVPT377 is a weekly academic course with online and in-person components. Students must be able to attend in-person class dates to participate in the program.
- There are no class meetings for GVPT376; you are earning credit for the hours spent working at your internship. Your internship supervisor will complete an evaluation of your performance.

Application Materials:

- Completed intake form. This form MUST be signed by your site supervisor. Applications without a signature will be considered incomplete.
- A cover letter detailing what you hope to gain from your internship and how it fits into your future career goals in government and politics. Please include contact information for one academic or professional reference with your cover letter.
- A current unofficial transcript. You may download this through Testudo.
- One-page resume highlighting previous employment or internships and relevant courses
- A short writing sample, less than 2 pages, that illustrates your research, analysis, and critical thinking skills. An example could be an excerpt from a paper you've written for class. Please provide a header that gives the context of the sample (i.e. research paper written for state and local government class)

If you are an International Relations student who would like to appeal to count GVPT377 as an International Relations Course of Choice 300/400 level, please submit a statement in addition to the above application materials that includes basic internship information (location, expected duties, hours) and justification for the International Relations designation. You should explain how the internship will address the program outcomes for your International Relations major. The program outcomes are:



- 1. Understand basic international relations concepts including power, political institutions, international organizations, political economy, theories of the state, political conflict and war, and contending analytical and theoretical approaches. (Both B.A. and B.S.)
- 2. Identify causes of systemic bias and discrimination against underrepresented groups and structural disadvantages of states in the Global South, such as persistent legacies of colonialism and imperialism, and critically evaluate theories and evidence on the impact of race and identity in international politics. (Both B.A. and B.S.)
- 3. Use international relations concepts, modes of inquiry, and analytic skills to address contemporary problems in international politics, understand the politics of diversity, and encourage civic engagement. (Both B.A. and B.S.)
- 4. Demonstrate familiarity with the methods, approaches, and theories used to interpret information applicable to international relations. (B.A. only)
- 5. Communicate key arguments and ideas in international relations effectively in writing and speaking. (B.A. only)
- 4. Understand, interpret, and produce empirical international relations research using sophisticated quantitative methodology. (B.S. only)
- 5. Communicate key arguments and the results of empirical analyses in international relations effectively in writing and speaking. (B.S. only)

Important Policies:

You are responsible for knowing the following policies:

- GVPT BA and BS majors are able to apply up to 6 experiential learning credits towards GVPT major requirements. IR BA majors are able to apply 6 experiential learning credits towards their major requirements with the following limitation: GVPT departmental approval is needed to use experiential learning credits for an IR/CP course of choice requirement (up to 6 credits). IR BS majors may apply a maximum of 3 experiential learning credits towards their major requirements with approval from GVPT's Director of Undergraduate Studies only. More information on the experiential learning credit policy can be found here.
- GVPT considers experiential learning to consist of approved internship programs (GVPT377, Federal/Global/Maryland Fellows Fall courses [NOT including ENGL381/HONR368A]),
 GVPT research and independent studies (GVPT388), the GVPT Undergraduate TA program (GVPT386/389), Mock Trial (GVPT217 and 317), and Moot Court (GVPT439L, GVPT439M, and GVPT439N). Opportunities that put students beyond the six-credit limit will be considered elective credit.
- Students are limited to registering for 17 credits prior to the first day of classes. Admission to the GVPT Internship Program does not override this policy.



- Priority for admission to the GVPT Internship Program will be given to students who still need to complete a GVPT course of choice and can use GVPT377 to do so.
- You must complete your internship in order to remain enrolled in and receive credit for GVPT377 and GVPT376.

Deadline:

Applications are reviewed on a rolling basis. Space is limited. Therefore, it is strongly recommended that you submit your application early. The final application deadline is 5PM on Thursday January 22, 2026. If this program fills prior to the final application deadline, applications will be reviewed for waitlist spots.
